What it IS...


We celebrate by **sharing our joy** and **life** in general over the fall **harvest**.

THE SUKKAH STRUCTURE:

Must be at least 27x27 square inches.

Must have three walls.

The roofing must be of detached vegetation and stars should be visible at night.


f We decorate the Sukkah's interior with fruits & flowers.



Shake the *lulav* and *etrog!*

Bringing the Four Species (shown below) together represents the need to unite our feelings, actions, speech and outlook.

HADAS – Myrtle Branch (eye shaped leaves) represents our outlook, Inedible but smells good. LULAV – Palm Branch (spine-like) signifies our actions, edible but no scent.



ETROG – Citron (heart shaped) stands for our feelings, great taste and fragrance.

ARAVA – Willow Branch (leaves like lips) expresses our speech, neither edible nor fragrant.
